From the Principal's Desk

As I told the students after Mass one week last year, it is one of the great joys that I experience as principal here at Bishop Brossart to be able, each month, to distribute the Eucharist to our students. Our entire profession as educators is about offering to our students our best, our knowledge of our subject, our life and professional experience, our work ethic. To be able then to offer to them not just my best, but literally the greatest gift in the world, the Body of Christ, is a true privilege. And really that ability to offer the Eucharist is the clearest expression of what we ultimately celebrate this Catholic Schools Week: the privilege of educating our students in and through the Body of Christ. Because that is what our faith tells us we are, the Body of Christ. So let me thank you for the privilege of educating your child. As we gather in Christ's name, they are Christ present to us, as we hope we will always be to them. So happy Catholic Schools Week to us all!

Now, it has been quite a winter so far. We can only hope that February will be a little less troublesome than December and January have been. I want to assure you that in cases of bad weather we will continue to keep our students', faculty's and staff's safety as our first priority. At this point we are in a position, as I notified you in my all-call, that we have to make up some days. As a result we will be in session on Presidents's Day and Easter Monday. Campbell County Schools will also be using Presidents' Day as a makeup day, so there will be bus transportation on each of those days. We will also be making up some time in the week following Memorial Day, although we have yet to determine how far into that week we will go. We will have to wait and see how February and early March treat us

before we make that determination. We will try to avoid impinging on Spring Break if at all possible.

We are currently in the process of putting together the calendar for next year. I would like, if possible, to build an extra couple of days into the schedule so that we can avoid having to make up snow days or add on to the year in mid-stream. The two suggestions to allow that have been to either shorten Fall Break to a four day weekend, or to simply put the three days after Memorial Day into the school calendar from the start. In either case, if, by some minor miracle, we escaped the winter without having days to make up, we could dismiss early and take days off of the end, which seems so much more pleasing an idea than adding them. If you have any strong preference on this matter I would ask that you either come to the February PTU meeting, at which this issue will be discussed briefly, or let me know otherwise, by phone, e-mail, letter or in person.

Let me also strongly encourage you to attend this February's PTU meeting in any event. The central focus of the meeting will be the scheduling of your child's classes for next year. Representatives of each of our academic departments will be here that night. They will rotate through speaking to parents from each of the three returning classes, explaining the curriculum options available to the students in that grade level. Parents will also receive the paperwork needed to begin the scheduling process, and a document which will allow them to more effectively chart their child's progress through the overall curriculum. We will also explain the simple technicalities of the class sign-up process. The response that we had to this evening last year was very positive, so I strongly urge you to make the time to be there.

Again let me thank you all for entrusting your children to Bishop Brossart and the Catholic school system of our Diocese. Have a great Catholic Schools Week, a tremendous month, and May God continue to bless you and your families.

Family Communication

The following "editorial" about family communication is suggested reading by Brian Kinne, BBHS Personal Counselor

Communication is basic and important in all stages of development. It is what relationships are built on—good communication determines good relationships.

Positive Family Communication is our Developmental Asset for the month of February. It is important because our family bond depends on it.

For the younger child, it's important for parents to speak positively; to use language that is understandable to them; and that also encourages them to join in the conversation.

- Help your children convey their feelings by giving them the right words to describe them.
- Ask "Why?" when a child is sad. They may not be ready to tell you, but let them know that you will be ready to listen when they are.
- Make eye contact when talking to your child. It not only shows you care, but it also makes them feel important.
- Teasing can quickly get out of hand. If your child isn't comfortable with it, stop it.
- Don't make fun of a crying child. This is a child's way of expressing sorrow. If you feel they are crying out of anger, then a better way

of handling it is to ignore it, or remove the child from the situation.

- Praise not only the accomplishment, but the effort.

For the middle to older child:

- Mealtime is a great time to get to know your child better. Ask questions, show interest.
- Your child may be more comfortable communicating when you're taking a walk, or driving the car. Sometimes, it's easier for older kids to talk about certain things when not making eye contact.
- Use other communication resources, such as letters, phone calls, or even e-mail, to keep kids connected to distant relatives. Extended family, the big picture, is very important too.
- A white board, a chalk board, or even a memo pad mounted on the refrigerator is a good way to stay in touch, or just write silly notes to each other when schedules get hectic.

Results from District Governor's Cup

Our academic team performed very well at District Governor's Cup which was held on Saturday, January 29. Once again, our team finished as District Runners-Up. We had two medal winners in each of 6 events of individual written competition including:

Austin Hinkel: 3rd place in Mathematics
Hank Nienaber: 3rd place in Science and 4th place in Social Studies
Andrew Callahan: 5th place in Science
Kyle Neltner: 1st place in Social Studies

Kyle Dorriere: 4th place in Language Arts and 3rd place in Arts and Humanities
 Courtney Neltner: 3rd place in Composition and 5th place in Language Arts
 Katie Hagedorn: 5th place in Arts and Humanities
 Julia Steffen: 2nd place in Composition

All nine of these students advanced to Regional Governor's cup, which will be held on February 19. As impressive as it is to this many students advancing, seven of these nine students are juniors and sophomores, which bodes well for the future of our team as well. Our students collected 40% of all the individual medals, the most of the five district schools that participated.

Our Quick Recall team also advanced to Regionals with a second place finish in double elimination format. Posting a first round victory over Highlands by a score of 21-17, our squad then went on to beat Calvary Christian 29-9. After a third round loss to Campbell County, we went on to beat Highlands again by a score of 36-10 before finally falling to Campbell County again 36-26. Sophomore Hank Nienaber led our scoring with 25 points, followed by Junior Austin Hinkel with 24, and Seniors Kyle Dorriere with 15, and Kristen Campbell with 13.

Congratulations to our entire team and wish them luck as they prepare for Regional Governor's Cup in hopes to advance to the state tournament.

As parents, you will have the opportunity to once again ask specific questions to AP teachers and/or department heads at the February PTU meeting that will focus on scheduling.

Advanced Placement Course Information PTU Presentation Monday, January 3, 2011

What is **A**dvanced **P**lacement (AP)?

AP is a designation given to 8 classes that we offer where the curriculum and final assessment is determined by The College Board, not by anyone at BBHS (see www.collegeboard.com.) These classes are taught as electives in high school but are taught at the "college level." They are demanding, rigorous, and difficult but offer some advantages to the serious student.

What are the pros?

- AP courses help students develop a stronger work ethic, better study habits, improve their depth of knowledge and critical thinking, and ultimately better prepares themselves for college. Studies have shown greater success in college for students who successfully complete AP courses in high school.
- Students can earn college credit by receiving a qualifying grade on an AP exam. College credits earned in high school give greater flexibility to scheduling in college. Some benefits include: the ability to take upper level electives sooner,

pursue a second degree, or even to free up time for study abroad and still graduate on time, etc.

- Students can be recognized as AP Scholars by achieving certain scores on 3 or more AP exams. See www.collegeboard.com/apscholar for more details.
- Students can receive an additional honor at graduation called the Commonwealth Diploma by taking at least four AP courses (one math or science, English, one social studies, and one foreign language.)
- Any student receiving a total of 8 points on any three AP exams will also have their money refunded for taking those three tests.

What are the cons?

- AP is not for everyone. AP courses are very difficult and demanding. They take real commitment, more reading, writing, and studying. From experience, I have seen that it is easy to be motivated in August and just prior to taking the AP exams, but what about in January? February? AP courses require regular, steady effort, not sporadic studying and cramming.
- Some students get in over their heads in terms of the workload. As a consequence, some of their other classes start to suffer and sometimes they even struggle to graduate.
- Students should not take AP classes only to get college credit. They need to have a genuine interest in the subject itself. I have found that if students take the courses because they want to learn, the credit will usually follow.

AP Classes are graded on a 5.0 Scale: GPA's for AP classes are figured from a 5.0 scale instead of a 4.0 scale, like all other classes. This gives a little extra "weight factor" to those who challenge themselves academically. A little word of warning though—due to the difficulty of the classes, some students may receive grades that they are not used to seeing.

AP Courses that we offer at BBHS (with teacher) and Prerequisites:

- **AP Biology** (Mr. Kues): must have approval of teacher
- **AP Calculus** (Mr. Phirman): must have taken Precalculus as a junior* with at least a C average.
- **AP English** (Ms. Campbell): must have approval of teacher, course take in lieu of English IV

- **AP European History** (Mr. May): summer reading required
- **AP French IV** (Mrs. LeRoy): must have taken French III as a junior and recommendation by teacher
- **AP Spanish IV** (Mrs. Bischoff): must have taken Spanish III as a junior and recommendation by teacher
- **AP US History** (Mr. May): summer reading required
- **AP World History** (Mr. Goller): summer reading required

*This is achieved by either testing into Honors Algebra II as a freshman or by taking both Geometry and Algebra II as a sophomore (by recommendation of teacher.)

How are AP Exams scored?

AP test scores and college credit have nothing to do with the grades received for the course at BBHS. In an extreme case, a student could receive a very poor grade at BBHS (related to not turning in assignments, etc.) but pass the AP exam for credit. The reverse is also possible where a student works very hard to earn a good grade at BBHS and yet does not pass the AP exam for college credit.

Scores on AP exams range from 1 to 5 (not to be confused with the 5.0 GPA scale at BBHS) and are interpreted as follows:

- 1 = no recommendation
- 2 = possibly qualified
- 3 = qualified
- 4 = well qualified
- 5 = extremely well qualified

A score of 3 is generally considered passing but varies—you must check this out and pursue it with the college(s) for proper credit.

The cost for taking the AP exams is approximately \$80 per exam.

VERY IMPORTANT: Every college, university, department, and degree major has different requirements for credit. You need to contact prospective schools (hopefully an advisor) to find out all the specifics! Remember, you won't get what you don't ask for. Some students have even received some credit for scoring a 2 on the AP exam.

You need to get physicals completed prior to the first tryout date to start. You will also need proof of insurance and if this is your first sport there is a \$75.00 participation fee per year. Spring sports begin February 15.

They defeated Deming 59-56 in overtime in the championship game. They are now 12-6 and will play West Carter Thursday evening in the All "A" State at Eastern Kentucky University at 9:30 PM. They also scored a huge overtime 49-42 win over Newport Central Catholic Friday Night.

The boys freshmen secured the Number 1 seed for the District Tournament going undefeated against District opponents and play Tuesday night against Silver Grove.

State All "A" Tourney tickets for our first game in Richmond vs West Carter will be available at school Tuesday at lunch in the cafeteria. All tickets are \$8.00 each. They will be \$9.00 at EKU.

Girls Basketball: The girl's varsity basketball team reached the semifinals of the Touchstone Energy All "A" Classic last week beating Calvary and falling to Maysville St. Patrick. The varsity team has improved to 11-8 and defeated Holmes 51-49 Friday and Dixie Heights Saturday 59-38.
